Just arrived on the Isle of Wight and can't decide where to go first? Here are 12 ideas for things to do to kick start your 2023 Island adventure.





1. ISLAND EVENTS

Dates for your holiday diary! The Isle of Wight Festival returns in June for three days of music and dancing. Head for the great outdoors with Walk the Wight for Mountbatten in May, and the IW Walking Festival in both spring and autumn. Ventnor Fringe takes over the town in a colourful celebration of comedy, art, and performance in July. Set sail for Cowes Week in August, and take in the annual Garlic Festival, offering a delicious taste of the Island's produce. A family favourite, the Chale Show showcases the best of horticulture, entertainment, food, and fun.

2. UK'S OLDEST THEME PARK

Opened in 1843, **Blackgang Chine** on the south coast of the Island is the UK's oldest theme park. Popular with Victorian visitors, the park remains a must visit for holiday makers over 180 years later! Dubbed "a land of imagination", **Blackgang** boasts a series of fantastical 'worlds', including Cowboy Town, Pirate Cove, Underwater Kingdom, Fairyland and Restricted Area 5 – complete with animatronic dinosaurs. You'll also find rides for all the family, places to eat, and spectacular views out to sea.

3. EAT WIGHT

Who doesn't love food? And the Island does it so well! Blessed with rich soil and longer hours of sunlight, Isle of Wight produce is some of the best around. A visit to the **Garlic Farm**, **Briddlesford Farm**, and **Harvey Browns** is a must for anyone wanting a taste of the Island. You'll find the best garlic, cheese, gin, mushrooms, tomatoes and asparagus, all grown or made right here, as well as locally reared meats, fresh seafood, flavoursome fruits and veggies, and more!



4. APPLEY BEACH

A dream spot for sunbathers, swimmers and sandcastle builders, **Appley Beach** is a stretch of golden sands from Appley Café to Puckpool Park. The sea at high tide is calm and ideal for swimming, while low tide exposes miles of wet sand perfect for paddling, walking and even horse riding. You'll find cafés at either end of the beach, a children's playpark, woodland, public WCs and parking. Appley Tower is a landmark of Ryde: a mock castle that once stood in the gardens of a grand estate.



5. FEEL 'GINSPIRED'

The Isle of Wight Distillery in Nettlestone produces high quality vodka, rum, and gin right here on the Island, infused with unique local ingredients. A must-sip for gin lovers, Mermaid gets its crisp and refreshing flavour from 10 ethically sourced coastal botanicals, lemon zest and a hint of sea air from wild foraged rock samphire from the Island coastline. You'll also find gin from another producer, the Isle of Wight Gin Company, available in local produce stores.






6. HIKE OR BIKE

With tons of outdoor space, the Island is a haven for walkers and cyclists. Whether you're looking for a relaxing stroll or a leg-burning climb, there are hundreds of routes to suit all abilities. Discover interesting landmarks and spectacular views wherever you go, with great pitstops along the way. Keen walkers can make it east to west across the Island in a day, while strong cyclists can navigate the popular **Round the Island cycle route** in close to 6 hours.



7. THE NEEDLES

The familiar rocks of **The Needles** remain a must-visit spot for first-time visitors. For Instagram-worthy photographs, board a pleasure boat or a high-speed RIB, which circles the famous lighthouse. Back on dry land, ride the famous chairlift before walking up to the imposing headland. **The National Trust's Battery** tells tales of rocket launches, wartime defences and shipwrecks. Head for the **Old Battery tearooms** for an unforgettable view or venture into the tunnel, which leads to a windswept outpost overlooking the rocks.



8. VITAMIN SEA

Being beside the sea is great for the soul and, whether you're into watching the waves or diving right in, there's no better place for some vitamin sea. A natural playground for the adventurous, the Island is great for swimming, paddleboarding, kiteboarding, surfing, sailing, windsurfing, and more. Bring your passions with you on the ferry or try something new while you're here. Equipment can be hired from **Tackt-Isle** in St Helens, **Wight Waters** in Lake, **Two Elements** in Cowes. to list a few.



9. ROARSOME ACTIVITIES 10. NO PRETTIER SPOT

Welcome to the Isle of Wight, otherwise known as 'Dinosaur Island'. Over 25 species of dinosaur have been found on the Island alone, the most recent a Spinosaurus in 2022. From museums to fossil hunts, there's no shortage of dino-based activities to help you learn about our prehistoric history. With 1000 Island fossils on display, the **Dinosaur Isle Museum** is a good place to start. **Island Gem's Fossil Trips** will take you on a guided tour of fossil hunting hotspots, or head out on your own to Compton and Brook beach to see fossilised dinosaur footprints at low tide.

11. LOOK TO THE SKIES

Separated from the mainland and characterised by miles of rolling countryside, the Isle of Wight has very little light pollution. This means its skies are some of the darkest in the UK, making the Island an amazing place to stargaze. Head for the West Wight and the coastal road — anywhere between Whale Chine (south) and Freshwater Bay (west) for a clear view of Orion's Belt, Gemini and The Dog Star twinkling overhead. Beginners can learn more about the stars at the Island Planetarium at Fort Victoria in Yarmouth.

12. PICNIC WITH A VIEW

Did you know that over half of the Isle of Wight is classed as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty? This makes it one of the most picturesque places to visit. Enjoy spectacular surroundings and breathtaking views with a picnic in the great outdoors. There are many beauty spots to choose from across the Island, but for 360-degree views across the landscape and out to sea, we recommend Brading Down, Culver Down, and Tennyson Down as great places to start.

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


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WHAT'S ON





Drawing over 500,000 revellers to the Island in 1970, the Isle of Wight Festival was once branded 'Europe's equivalent to Woodstock'. Revived in 2002, the modern era of the iconic event remains a key date in the festival calendar. Spanning 3 days in June, the fun-packed weekend kick-starts the UK festival season – this year with headliners such as George Ezra, Pulp, and Robbie Williams. The Isle of Wight Festival has so much on offer alongside the music, with fairground rides, stalls, themed bars, kids' areas, street food outlets, and more.



Walk the Wight 14 May mountbatten.org.uk / Islandwide

Each year, thousands descend on the Island's south coast to hike a hilly 26.5 miles from Bembridge in the east to the iconic Needles in the west. Proceeds raised go to Mountbatten IW, who provide vital support for Islanders. The full walk is a real challenge, but don't be put off if you're not an avid rambler, as shorter (and flatter!) routes are also available, plus a kids' walk too. Walk the Wight is a great way to explore the Island, take in the views, and connect with nature – and all for a great cause. Not bad for what originally started out as a small team-building exercise at a local firm!





Ventnor Fringe S 21 – 30 July vfringe.co.uk / Ventnor

Some of the biggest acts in showbiz made their name through the fringe circuit, and these festivals remain one of the best ways to discover the freshest up-and-coming talent. Taking inspiration from the Edinburgh event, the pretty Victorian resort town of Ventnor is transformed for its own Fringe. This event is a celebration of creative arts with over 100 different performances – from comedy to cabaret, and everything in between. If you're not here during the Fringe, don't fret - you can check out Ventnor Exchange for shows all year round.



Wight Proms № 11 – 20 August wightproms.co.uk / Cowes

Set in the glorious grounds of Grade II listed Northwood House, the festival of open-air picnic concerts returns each year bigger and better than the last, with the event duration doubled in length for 2023! Embrace balmy summer evenings on the lawn as each night takes on a different theme, including opera, comedy, drag, and more, before the event concludes with the traditional finale 'Last Wight of The Proms'.



Scooter Rally = 25 - 28 August vfmscoot.co.uk / Ryde

Those with a love of Lambrettas and vintage Vespas will want to visit over the August Bank Holiday, when scores of scooterists take to the Island roads for the Isle of Wight International Scooter Rally. At the centre of the event, Ryde town plays homage to the era of the scooter with decorations and music, with many scooterists decked out in iconic '60s dress. Ryde seafront is the place to be on the Sunday of the event, where the scooters assemble ahead of their traditional ride-out and can be seen on full display, some featuring all manner of modifications!

Cowes Week N 30 July – 5 August cowesweek.co.uk / Cowes

Dating back to 1826, Cowes Week is the world's oldest annual sailing regatta, and one of the Island's most historic events. Attracting competitors from all over the world, Cowes Week is a rite of passage for any sailing enthusiast and a real celebration of the sport. For the non-sailing population, dedicated event areas and the local town offer a plethora of bars, great places to eat, and live entertainment and music during the week.

1 ALUM BAY

Looking for a beach with a view? Accessed via a long set of steep steps, or the chairlift from The Needles Landmark attraction above, this sand/shingle beach has views straight over the bay to the iconic Needles rocks and lighthouse. The impressive cliffs are famously made up of coloured sands.

13 BEMBRIDGE

There are three beaches to choose from here. Bembridge Point runs to the edge of the harbour, with a large sandbank at low tide; Under Tyne to the north of the lifeboat station is sandy below the shore line, and good for swimming; and Forelands, which curves around the most easterly point of the Island, has rockpools to explore when the tide is out.

18 BONCHURCH MONKS BAY

Set in a secluded little bay at the edge of the village of Bonchurch, this beach is a mix of sand and shingle, with rock breakwaters. Formerly a landing spot for smugglers, there are a few houses down by the shore and mainly woodland to the rear. There's no parking at the bay itself, but there is a small car park on Shore Rd in Bonchurch a short walk away. The most scenic way to get here is a mile-long hike along from Ventnor seafront.

21 BROOK

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Dinosaur fans often make a beeline for this sandy beach, for the fossilised dino footprints that appear at low tides. There is also a petrified forest further along the beach at Hanover Point, which is visible at low tides. Swimming and sunbathing are popular at Brook, although care should be taken as it can be rocky in parts.



The wide sandy shores of Appley Beach are a playground for beachgoers. The tide goes right out, leaving loads of space for games, sunbathing and sandcastle building. And the gentle incline makes it a great beach for paddling in the sea. The mysterious Appley Tower stands tall over the sands, and there's a large wooded area and park nearby, with a kids' adventure playground. For ice creams and refreshments, there's a choice of two cafés either end of the beach.

22 COMPTON BAY

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Once considered the "locals' secret", Compton Bay has in recent years found itself as one of the Island's most popular beaches with both visitors and locals. The bay encloses a long long sandy beach, with rugged sandstone cliffs and stunning views of the white chalk cliffs. It boasts great waters for swimming and watersports, and is a good spot for for families — just bear in mind that it gets very busy in the summer.

5 COWES

Just along from the main parade in Cowes is the town's main beach, which is mostly shingle and pebble. It's safe for swimming; however, this beach tends to be at its busiest in July and August, on account of the fact it's one of the best spots to watch the sailing events.

6 EAST COWES

At the edge of East Cowes, along the esplanade, is this shingle and sand beach, with fabulous views back across to West Cowes and its harbour. A good place to visit if you're looking for a quieter beach in the main season, it's great for swimming and has woodland to the rear with some short walks to explore.

23 FRESHWATER BAY

One of the Island's most picturesque beaches, with two impressive rock stacks standing at the eastern end, Freshwater Bay is made up mainly of stone and shingle, with some sand away to the west end. If you're looking for a beach to visit on a grey day, or prefer skimming stones to sunbathing, this is a great choice. A rock ledge appears at low tide, which makes it great for rockpooling, and the steeper inclines lead to some impressive waves on stormy days. The old smugglers' caves at the eastern end of the bay can be reached at very low tides.

3 COLWELL BAY - GREAT FOR SUNSETS



Great for swimming and sunsets, Colwell Bay is a sandy beach that is very popular with families and watersports fans. At the back of the beach are rows of brightly decorated beach huts, and a restaurant that attracts many diners by boat in the summer months. It's also one of the best spots on the Island to watch the sun set, so worth a visit in the early evening!

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4 GURNARD

Gurnard Beach is one of the Island's best spots for summer sunsets, with its row of striking beach huts and palm trees providing the perfect foreground for a photo. The beach itself is made up of a short stretch of sand and shingle, and there's a village green behind the huts, with a small adventure playground to keep the kids entertained. On a warm day, grab an ice cream and take the flat walk along the promenade from nearby Cowes, enjoying the setting sun as you wander.

7 OSBORNE

Not many places can boast a "royal" beach, other than the Isle of Wight! You'll have to pay to enter the house and grounds at Osborne to experience this one, but it's a great place for a paddle and picnic. There's a café serving delicious Minghella ice cream at the beach, and they host traditional Punch and Judy shows in the summer

8 RYDE EAST

As with Ryde's other beaches, the tide goes right out here, leaving lots of open space for relaxing, sunbathing and beach fun. Its golden sands are good for swimming, but we'd recommend waiting for high tide, when you've got less of a walk to the shoreline. To the rear of the beach is a playground, traditional amusements, and boating lake, with the main town just a short walk away.

16 SANDOWN

Long sandy beaches are a feature of the Bay area, and Sandown's is one of the most popular spots. Instantly recognisable for the traditional pleasure pier halfway along, there are plenty of places to eat, shop, and entertain yourself along this stretch of beach and seafront. Deckchairs and sun loungers are available to hire from beach outlets.

11 SEAGROVE

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Seagrove has several large seaside properties to its rear and is one of the Island's most exclusive-looking beaches. Whilst it's mainly shingle and stone above the tide line, when the tide is out there's a large expanse of sand, making it popular for bathing, beach activities, and watersports. It's also the main access for neighbouring Priory Bay beach, which is one of the Island's hidden gems.

17 SHANKLIN

There are lots of options around the Island if you're looking to swim in the sea, and the beaches at Shanklin are some of the best. Extensive stretches of golden sands minimise your potential rock encounters, and a steady incline means you don't have to walk for miles before the water reaches above your knees. The seafront at Shanklin is a throwback to traditional "bucket and spade" holidays, with traditional amusements, crazy golf, ice cream parlours, and deckchair and sun lounger hire. The beaches get busy in the summer season, but head to the west of the esplanade, and it's usually quieter.



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10 SPRINGVALE



A long stretch of sand and shingle, Springvale links Ryde's beaches to Seaview. Springvale beach is popular for sailing and windsurfing and is a good alternative to some of the busier beaches in the summer if you're looking to do some sunbathing and swimming. There's a nice walk through a nature reserve to the back of the beach

20 STEEPHILL COVE



Steephill is a charming cove made up of fishermen's cottages, colourful beach huts, cosy eateries and a sheltered sand and shingle beach. The waters are great for swimming, and there are rockpools to explore at lower tides. The easiest way to access Steephill Cove is to park at the western end of Ventnor esplanade, and follow the coast path along for approximately 900 metres.

2 TOTLAND BAY

Often a guieter beach than some of its neighbours, due to its predominantly shingle makeup. Totland Bay has all the great views of neighbouring Colwell and, if you can wait for the tide to recede enough to reveal the sandier parts, is just as good for swimming. The end of the small pier is (at the time of writing) still in the process of being refurbished.

A long stretch of sandy beach and dunes can be found at St Helens, which runs runs to the entrance of Bembridge Harbour. The old church overlooks the beach, with the former golf course of the "Duver" supplying lots of green outdoor space to explore, and the causeway at the back of the harbour leading into the village. Watersports and adventure activities are popular here, with an activity centre at the edge of the harbour.

19 VENTNOR

Another of the Island's traditional seafronts and beaches can be found in Ventnor albeit with a more recently built bandstand and small harbour for fishing boats at the eastern end. The beach is made up of shingle and sand and has rows of former Victorian bathing machines, which are now converted to beach huts. It's great for swimming, and there are plenty of places to grab an ice cream or snack during a visit.

14 WHITECLIFF BAY





One of the Island's most beautiful beaches, but is also one of the toughest to access. Guests of the holiday park above can take advantage of a shuttle service, but otherwise you'll have to walk from either Bembridge or Culver, then navigate the very steep slope down to the beach. Aim to go at low tide, as the beach all but disappears when it's high.



Curving round from the southern edge of Culver Down, until it meets Sandown's main beach, Yaverland is a complete contrast to its more traditional neighbour. With chalk cliffs at one end, and sandstone cliffs to the rear, this sandy beach is more alike to those found on the west side of the Island. Along with being a popular beach for swimming and watersports, it's also good for fossil hunting.

OTHER BEACHES TO EXPLORE

CHILTON CHINE

Adjacent to Isle of Wight Pearl on the Military Road you'll find Chilton Chine and beach. This shingle and sand beach offers similar features to the more popular beaches further west. There's a small car park and guite a steep access to the beach itself, but it's worth the effort.

PLAYERS BEACH

Players Beach in Ryde is one of the quieter beaches you'll find, largely due to its less than obvious access. A small passageway off the side of a mainly residential road on the seafront takes you through to the beach. Avoid visiting at high tide, as the beach all but disappears.

PRIORY BAY

The sandy beach at Priory Bay is simply stunning. Backed by 7.5 acres of woodland, and only accessible from the coast path, or the neighbouring beaches of St Helens or Seagrove Bay at lower tides, its picturesque setting makes it unlike any other beach on the Island.

SANDHARD BEACH


Sandhard is a mainly shingle beach, accessed via a short walk along the coast path from either Yarmouth Harbour or Fort Victoria. It has beautiful views out across the Solent, and its lack of car park tends to limit the number of visitors, even in the summer months.

WATCOMBE BAY

If you're a keen kayaker, or have access to a boat, make sure to explore Watcombe Bay on a calm day. Pretty much only accessible from the sea, round to the west of Freshwater Bay, this beach has tall chalk cliffs to the rear and a fabulous outlook into the channel.



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FOR YOUNGER KIDS

Parents of toddlers are likely to spend a lot of time pushing a swing whilst on holiday – so you might as well find one with a good view!

In the South Wight, we like the small Seabreeze playground, which sits high up overlooking Ventnor's seafront. Gurnard and East Cowes in the North Wight both have good-sized play areas with views of the Solent. If you want to combine a playground with sandcastle building, go for Appley in Ryde or **Sandham Gardens** in Sandown/ Yaverland.

Our children also love a trip to the **Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary**. You can easily fill a couple of hours wandering round and meeting the animals.

FOR OLDER KIDS/TEENAGERS

A day out at the seaside is the obvious choice for children and teens – but you need to pick the right beach!

For swimming and sandcastles, try Sandown or Shanklin. If your children enjoy a bit of rockpooling, head for Bembridge at low tide. Confident swimmers and bodyboarders will enjoy the crashing waves which can often be found at Compton Bay or Dunroamin Beach in Lake.

Older children and teenagers may enjoy exploring the Island's isolated southern coastline around Castlehaven, Blackgang Beach, and Binnel Bay.

If you're visiting in summer, pop along to one of the Island's carnivals, which take place in most of the main towns.

FOR THE ADULTS

Where to start?! - There's the Bus and Coach Museum in Ryde; the world-famous Garlic Farm; Bembridge's lifeboat station; the impressive ruins of Appuldurcombe House; the working Benedictine monastery of Quarr Abbey at Fishbourne; a free museum in Cowes (the Max Aitken Museum); the Needles New Battery and so on!

There are also several fascinating churches, including the tiny St Lawrence Old Church, Queen Victoria's church in Whippingham, and the thatched St Agnes Church in Freshwater Bay.

Seasoned SUP boarders can enjoy venturing bay to bay around the Island, or why not take a trip down the River Yar, an area of outstanding natural beauty between Freshwater and Yarmouth? Knowledge of tides and safety equipment is essential, so we recommend signing up for coasteering with the experts at **Freshwater Bay Coasteering** (fbciow.com).

HORSE RIDING

What better place to get in the saddle than on the beach? Whether you're a novice or an experienced equestrian, the Island's friendly riding centres cater to all. Paddle through the shallows with your four-legged friend at **Sally's Riding School** (sallysridingschool.com) in St Helens, or hack to the beach with **Hill Farm Stables** (hillfarmstables.com) in Freshwater. For a gallop along Appley Beach at low tide, contact **Island Riding Centre** (islandriding.com) or **Trotters Riding** (trottersriding.co.uk).

PARAGLIDING

Take to the skies and explore the Island from above. The ultimate holiday experience for thrill seekers, sign up for a tandem flight with **High Adventure Paragliding** (highadventureparagliding.co.uk). Learn the ropes with your instructor before leaping from the clifftop to glide high above the Island's stunning west wight landscape. For keen paragliders, check into "para-dise" at **Butterfly Paragliding & B&B** (paraglide.uk.com) – and take off from the garden!

TREE CLIMBING

This unique activity combines the skill of rock climbing with the thrill of high ropes, as you climb branch to branch into the canopy of a great tree overlooking Appley Beach. Once at the top admire the view or relax in a hammock with a flapjack, before heading back to ground. An experience open to adults and children, see **Good Leaf** (goodleaf.co.uk) for more info.









RAINY DAYS OUT

Wondering what to do when one of the sunniest places in the UK decides to drop a rainy day during your holiday? Don't worry; we have plenty of all-weather ideas guaranteed to keep the entire family happy should the odd rainy day occur!



EMBRACE THE ELEMENTS

No matter your age, it's always fun to get out in the elements with the family and have some outdoor adventures in the rain. So, grab your wellies (and maybe a wetsuit) and give these a try...

Woodland Walks - explore the Island under the shelter of tree canopies. Firestone Copse, Parkhurst Forest and Bouldnor Forest are all beautiful spots, with a good network of paths to explore.

Watersports - you're already getting wet, so why not head out to sea and tackle some watersports? Try stand-up paddleboarding or surfing with **iSurf**.

Beach Walks - wrap up warm and get out to explore some of the Island's beaches. Look out for easy walks along the sea walls from Ventnor to Bonchurch, and Sandown to Shanklin.

Leave the phones behind and have a go at some of these Isle of Wight adrenaline-filled activities perfect for older kids and teenagers...

Go Karting - according to **Wight Karting's** customers, whizzing around the 520m floodlight track is even more fun in the rain!

Laser Quest & Bowling - have a go at one or both boredom-busting activities all under one roof at **Ryde Superbowl**!

Go for a Skate - get your skates on and have a go at retro roller skating! Beginner, advanced, disco, and family sessions are available at **Skates the Quay!** For the skateboarders, head to award-winning **John Cattle's Skate Club**, suitable for all ages!

Wipeout at the Aqua Park - fans of Total Wipeout will love the 20+ obstacles course at the **Isle of Wight Aqua Park**. Great fun for confident swimmers aged 8 and over.





FOR THE ADULTS

It's time to explore the local area, learn about the heritage, try something new and get a real taste of Island produce. Here are a few ideas to get you started...

Retail Therapy - there are plenty of boutique stores in the main towns, with lots of local treats to explore. **The Garlic Farm** and **Isle of Wight Distillery** are perfect places to pick up gifts and just relax with your partner or friends.

Get Crafty - learn to make something with a 'hands-on' workshop. Book in at **The Jewellery Cabin**, near Newport, to create a unique pendant or set of earrings. **The Quay Arts** also runs regular workshops and courses for anyone looking to get creative.

Take a Trip Back in Time - the Island boasts some fantastic indoor heritage attractions, including Queen Victoria's palace by the sea at **Osborne**, and one of the UK's finest Roman sites, **Brading Roman Villa**.

Play Games! - Board Games aren't just for kids, at Snacks & Ladders Board Game Café you can choose from hundreds of board games (both child and adult themed) whilst enjoying something tasty from their food menu, including a delicious cocktail! For next-level fun and to test your puzzlesolving skills, why not try Random-Rooms and pick from five unique escape room challenges!

FOR YOUNGER KIDS

Beat the boredom and bring on the fun with these all-weather ideas for little legends who love to keep busy...




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




EXPLORE THE ISLAND



Whether you're staying locally, visiting for the day, or just passing through, our Explore guide breaks the Island up into areas to give you a flavour of each of them. Let us take you for a quick hop around the Island to explore the main towns, villages, and areas, with a decent helping of recommendations for places to go, things to look out for, and top tips, to help you get the most out of your Isle of Wight stay!

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
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GURNARD

Why Go? Less than a mile to the west of Cowes is the village of Gurnard. The waters here are very popular for sailing and watersports, but undoubtedly one of the most striking features of Gurnard is its jaw-dropping sunsets. Park along the esplanade on a clear evening, find yourself a great spot to watch (behind the beach huts is a great photo spot), and kick back and enjoy the show. Locals and dog walkers often head to the back of the village's sailing club towards a hidden beach that backs onto woodland.

WEST COWES

Why Go? The vibrant streets of West Cowes contain a mixture of boutique-style shops, traditional pubs and inns, and trendy cafés and restaurants. During the sailing season, the harbour and waterfront are a hive of action. **Cowes Week**, which takes place every year in

early August, draws large crowds to watch the competition out on the water. Enjoy the festival atmosphere in the town, with entertainment and live music. If sailing is not your thing, there's still plenty to explore.

For a one-off souvenir, visit **Kendall's Fine Art** (kendallsfineart.co.uk) or **Bath Road Gallery** (bathroadgallery.co.uk). Both galleries offer originals from local artists with a strong coastal influence.

Spare a few minutes to explore the **Sir Max Aitken Museum** (sirmaxaitkenmuseum.org). Its former owner was a Battle of Britain pilot and newspaper publisher who amassed a fascinating collection of antiques and oddities – including Napoleon's cradle and a letter signed by Nelson! History fans should also explore the **Wight Military & Heritage Museum** (wmahm.org.uk) which is on the road that links Newport and Cowes.

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Feeling Hungry?

Many of the best pubs and restaurants in Cowes are around the pedestrianised town centre, which has a lovely buzz to it during summer evenings.

Foodies after a memorable dining experience should book a table at **Call It What You Want** (ciwyw.co.uk) or **Moocow** (moocowstuff.com). For sea views and sunsets, try the

New Holmwood Restaurant

(newholmwoodhotel.co.uk), which is located right on the seafront, just out of the main town. For something less formal, catch some live music at **The Anchor** (theanchorcowes.co.uk) or get a fish and chip takeaway from **Corries Cabin**. Walk for five minutes to the benches on The Parade for the best views.

For lunch or breakfast, try **Jolliffes Eatery** (facebook.com/jolliffeseatery), which sits within a Grade II-listed building on the high street. **Richmonds Bakery** (iowbakery.com) has an outstanding reputation and a daily selection of showstoppers.

EAST COWES

Why Go? East Cowes is perhaps best known for Queen Victoria's royal palace at Osborne (english-heritage.org.uk/osborne). If you're on the West side of the town, catch the 'floating bridge' which runs from early morning to late at night. On reaching East Cowes, if you're on foot, catch the number four bus or walk for about one mile to the Osborne entrance. Osborne offers something for almost any visitor, with the house and its many collections, and extensive grounds and gardens. During the warmer months, head for the royal beach to watch a traditional Punch and Judy show.

For a free alternative, visit **St Mildred's** Church (whippinghameastcowes.org.uk) in Whippingham. Queen Victoria was a regular worshipper, and the church has several royal artefacts to discover.

The beach at East Cowes isn't the sort of place that you'll be building sandcastles. However, it is a pleasant spot for a wander whilst watching yachts and ferries in Cowes harbour.

Top Tip - Investing in History

Visitors to **Osborne House** might consider signing up for English Heritage membership (english-heritage.org.uk/join) rather than paying one-off entrance fees. Family visits to the charity's three ticketed Isle of Wight attractions total almost £100 to include **Osborne House**, **Carisbrooke Castle** and **Yarmouth Castle**. For a small additional cost, you could purchase annual membership to English Heritage, which gives you access to around 400 other mainland attractions.







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Feeling Hungry?

East Cowes doesn't have as many places to eat out as West Cowes, but there are a few standout options.

Prego (pregoiow.uk) offers excellent quality and straightforward Italian dining, and is less than a minute's walk from our terminal. Good-quality pub food is available at **The Lifeboat** (thelifeboatcowes.co.uk), which is hidden away on the River Medina, a five-minute drive from our East Cowes terminal.

For a tasty treat call into **SLAB Artisan Fudge** (slabfudge.co.uk), which recently relocated from the West side of the river. Sample a resident favourite such as rocky road fudge, or go for a limited edition flavour.

A less well-known spot for foodies in the area is the **Artisan Café** (instagram.com/artisancafeby_rusticcrust) on York Avenue, which serves up organic sourdough, croissants, and Island Roasted coffee.

Top Tip - Meet the Minibeasts

One of the Isle of Wight's longestestablished animal attractions is

Butterfly World (butterflyworldiow.com), which sits between Newport and Wootton Bridge. The collection of butterflies is stunning, but many visitors are unaware of the attraction's other residents, which are lovingly cared for by staff. A highlight for many is the chance to handle a tarantula or a snake – although it's not obligatory! Feeding the Koi fish is another experience not to be missed. Stop for a quick refreshment at Butterfly World's Hungry Caterpillar café.

WOOTTON BRIDGE

Why Go? The village of Wootton is found midway between the two major towns of Ryde and Newport and is most recognisable for its tidal creek, and large mill pond, which sit either side of its namesake bridge. There are several great walks in this area, one of which takes you through to Woodside Bay, the location of the 1969 Isle of Wight Festival. Over 100,000 festival-goers descended on the village for this event, which was headlined by Bob Dylan.

OSBORNE

Victoria and Albert's palace by the sea

THE GARDEN



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NEWPORT

Why Go? Shopping in Newport offers less of a distraction from mainland life than other Isle of Wight towns, but it has its own charm.

Homeware and hardware store **W Hurst & Sons** (hurst-iw.co.uk) is something of an Island icon and was named as the UK's favourite local business in a recent competition.

Enjoy a tasty treat whilst playing one of the 600+ board games at **Snacks + Ladders** (snacksandladders.co.uk). It was a deserved winner at the Red Funnel Isle of Wight Awards in 2022. Pop culture and great coffee can be found at **Comicoffee** on Pyle Street (comicoffee.uk).

For a bit of family fun, sign up for a session at **Skates** (4dsportsclubs.co.uk), the Isle of Wight's roller disco! Nearby, you'll find the small Museum of Island History, and Watchbell Lane, which must be the Island's narrowest shopping street.

Meanwhile, **Quay Arts** (quayarts.org), has galleries to visit, a craft shop selling locally made gifts and a café bar with riverside terrace. Return in the evening for theatre and live music.

This side of Newport is also home to the **Isle of Wight Festival** in June (isleofwightfestival.com). Outside of festival time, you can explore the park and arboretum or walk along the banks of the River Medina to see the remains of paddle steamer ship "Ryde Queen".

A short drive from Newport is the imposing **Carisbrooke Castle** (english-heritage.org. uk), where Charles I was imprisoned before his execution. A free alternative is the one-mile walk around the Castle's grounds. Children will love running up and down the dry moat.

From the Castle, walk through to **Carisbrooke Priory** (carisbrookepriory.org.uk), which is a
less well-known historic gem on the Island. The
former nunnery is now a house of prayer which
is free to visit. Explore the atmospheric cloisters,
chapel and courtyard garden or stop for a coffee
in the tea rooms. Call ahead, as it's not open
every day.



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Feeling Hungry?

Foodies looking for a tasting menu should try **Thompson's** (robertthompson.co.uk) in Newport town centre. For a more conventional fine dining experience, book a table at **Hewitts** (hewittsrestaurant.com) or sample **Da Vinci's** Mediterranean menu (davinciiow.co.uk).

St Thomas' Square is the place for al fresco lunch, with cafés and restaurants including French Franks (frenchfranks.co.uk) and Toto (totoiow.co.uk). "Zero waste" store **Peach** (peach-veganzerowaste.co.uk) caters for vegan diners in its cosy café.

If dining with a view is your priority, head out of town to The Blacksmiths (blacksmithsiow. co.uk), which was crowned best pub at the Isle of Wight Awards in 2021 and was runner-up in 2022.

GODSHILL

Why Go? The picturesque village of Godshill is home to much of the Island's older architecture and the "chocolate box" cottages that have adorned the front of many postcards. Take a wander up to All Saints Church, which overlooks the famous village.

Explore the emporium of shops at the **Old Smithy**, which links up with the large free car park. Children will enjoy the small detour through the model-filled Old Smithy Gardens. You'll then emerge onto Godshill's main street, which is furnished with traditional tearooms and quirky shops.

Check out the delightful Godshill Model **Village** (modelvillagegodshill.co.uk), which depicts Godshill, and the nearby resort of Shanklin, in perfect miniature, surrounded by award-winning gardens.

Top Tip - A Villa Worth a Visit


The Isle of Wight's largest Roman Villa can be found in Brading, but Newport Roman Villa is a charming curiosity (iow.gov.uk/Visitors/Where-to-go/Newport-Roman-Villa). Visitors can see well-preserved mosaics and even an early attempt at underfloor heating! It sits in an unassuming spot on the pleasant residential streets of Shide. The third-century home was discovered in 1920 and is thought to be just one part of a grand estate. That leaves the tantalising possibility that several surrounding houses sit on top of Roman remains.

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THE DOWNS AND SURROUNDING AREA

Why Go? When you hear reference to "The Downs" on the Isle of Wight, it usually refers to the central area of Arreton, Mersley, Ashey and Brading downs. Southern Vectis's open top bus tours will show you the best views during the warmer months. Travel as a group or buy a Rover + Breezer ticket for the best value. It's valid for 24 hours, so canny visitors spend one afternoon on The Downs tour and the next morning on The Needles open top bus tour.

The valleys surrounding the downland are known for farming and local produce. Isle of Wight tomatoes, produced in Arreton, can be found in most supermarkets.

Top Tip - Join the Treasure Hunters

Several of the Isle of Wight's towns and villages have their own Treasure Trails (treasuretrails.co.uk), including Newport and Godshill. Each set of clues provides a neat way to discover local history whilst adding a bit of motivation to a family walk! Newport's trail is 1.5 miles long and is themed around some cheeky gremlins who have been causing trouble in the Island's county town. Meanwhile, the Godshill trail turns walkers into detectives trying to crack a case whilst completing a one-mile route.

At **Arreton Barns** (arretonbarns.co.uk) you'll discover resident artists and craftspeople, as well as a farm shop, a shipwreck heritage centre and a popular pub (dairymansdaughter.co.uk). Further east, along the Arreton Valley, is the famous **Garlic Farm** (thegarlicfarm.co.uk). Entry is free but it's worth paying a few pounds for the tractor trailer tour of the farmland.

Active families will love a day out at **Robin Hill** (robin-hill.com) with its toboggan run, treetop bouncy nets, falconry, and late-night summer shows. Tickets entitle you to free returns for seven days, so don't wait until the last day of your holiday!







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


















RYDE

WHY GO? Ryde combines traditional seaside fun, Victorian architecture and unexpected hidden gems. Enjoy a long spacious sandy beach, a thriving independent shopping scene and a whole host of great places to eat out.

Shop vintage clothes at **The Velvet Pig** (thevelvetpig.com), designer interiors at Bou Chic (bouchic.co.uk) or combine coffee with fashion at **House of Zabre** (facebook.com/zabreiow).


The vintage theme continues at the **Isle of Wight Bus and Coach Museum** (iwbusmuseum.org.uk), which is free to visit thanks to its army of dedicated volunteers. If trains are more your thing, visit the **Isle of Wight Steam Railway** (iwsteamrailway.co.uk), which connects at Smallbrook Station with the East Wight's modern railway.

Top Tip - The Studio by the Sea
Ryde's Monkton Arts (facebook.
com/monktonarts) is a melting pot
for creatives in the East Wight with its
mix of studios, live music, and good food.
During the day, pop into Monkton's Lounge
Café for a flat white and a visit to the two
galleries. Exhibitions change every fortnight
and often reflect the town's relationship with
the sea. In the evening, you can expect to
be entertained by a live jazz band or a bit of
rhythm and blues

Local history can also be discovered at **The Lost Crypt Escape Room** (thelostcrypt.co.uk), which is the UK's first escape room in a real church crypt. It combines real history with a series of challenging puzzles.

The golden sands of Appley in Ryde are the home of beach sports on the Island. The sprawling seafront provides much entertainment with two playgrounds and a boating lake. If a swim in the sea doesn't appeal, visit the **Waterside Swimming Pool** (watersidepool. co.uk) which retracts its roof on sunny days.

Continue along the seafront until you reach the **Dell Café** (dellcafe.com) for a coffee by the beach huts of Appley. Behind you is **Goodleaf** (goodleaf.co.uk), where you can sign up for a tree climbing lesson, complete with harnesses and helmets.

Feeling Hungry?

Ryde has an abundance of places to satisfy most appetites.

For lunchtime meze, book a table at **Ada Mediterranean Kitchen** (adamediterraneanryde.co.uk). Popular cafés include **No.64** (no64ryde.com) and **The Wonky Goat** (thewonkygoat.co.uk).

For an evening out, spread your wings and try **The Duck** (theduckiow.co.uk) or **Heron** (heroniow.co.uk), which now holds two AA Rosettes. Both offer modern cuisine near the seafront. A meal with a view can be enjoyed at the **Cadet Beach Club** (cadetbeachclub.co.uk) seafood restaurant near Appley Tower.

Meanwhile, **Michelangelo's** (ristorantemichelangelo.co.uk) combines authentic Italian food with an integrated delicatessen.

Top Tip - Simply the Zest

Mermaid Gin (isleofwightdistillery.
com) has become a familiar sight in
up-market bars around the world, thanks
to its emphasis on sustainability – and its
exquisitely designed bottle. Eagle-eyed fans
even spotted it behind 007 in a scene of No
Time To Die! Their new zesty flavour can
be sampled in bars across the Island and
beyond. It combines grapefruit and rosemary
with locally foraged rock samphire.

SEAVIEW

WHY GO? Much of Seaview's reputation as an upmarket Edwardian resort was built on its panoramic sea views and sandy beaches. These are still two of its biggest assets. In August, the village regatta (seaviewvillageregatta.co.uk) brings locals out onto the water for yacht races and tug-of-war competitions.

The beach of Springvale offers some of the best views, straight across to Portsmouth's Spinnaker Tower and the famous Solent forts. Following the coast path takes you around the village and onto the more sheltered Seagrove Bay. Venture through the woods to Priory Bay for an idyllic sandy beach with a woodland backdrop.

Feeling Hungry?

The Old Fort (theoldfortseaview.co.uk) is a popular choice for seafront dining in a lively setting. Round the corner is Aquitania within the **Seaview Hotel** (seaviewhotel.co.uk), which has a Michelin Bib Gourmand award

For a snack in the sunshine, walk from Seaview to Puckpool Park. This Victorian-era battery hums with the sound of children enjoying the playground whilst grown-ups relax at the **Old Barracks Café** (theoldbarracks.co.uk). After you've recharged, pick up a club from the café and take on the old-fashioned minigolf course.



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ST HELENS

WHY GO? The biggest draw in St Helens is its mostly sandy beach, in the shadow of a ruined church. Head to **Tackt-Isle Adventures** (tackt-isle.co.uk) to explore the sheltered bay on a paddleboard.

Dogs are welcome at St Helens all year round and will have plenty of space for exercise at low tide. National Trust members should drive past the main seafront and park for free slightly further along. Spare a few minutes for a walk around the former Victorian golf course behind the beach, which is known as The Duver.



Top Tip - Horsing Around Sally's Riding School

(sallysridingschool.com) picks up reviews of 5/5 on TripAdvisor for its expert-led rides along the East Wight's sandy beaches. You'll be equipped with safety gear and riding boots before setting off to enjoy the wide-open sandy beaches at low tide. Outings take place on St Helens Beach and Bembridge Beach and are open to beginners or more experienced riders.

BEMBRIDGE

WHY GO? Bembridge must be the UK's only village with an airport, a windmill and a lifeboat station. It is also home to a museum, several churches, a harbour, three beaches, a small high street and half a dozen pubs and cafés.

Start with the dog-friendly beach by **Bembridge Lifeboat Station** (bembridgelifeboat.org.uk). Take a walk along the pier to see the lifeboat, which hangs at a 45-degree angle, ready to launch into the Solent

The beach at Bembridge is perhaps the best on the Island for rockpooling. Check the tide times, pick up a bucket and net from the RNLI shop and compete to find the biggest crab.

Feeling Hungry?

Waterside dining doesn't get much closer than **The Best Dressed Crab** (thebestdressedcrabintown.co.uk), which serves seafood on a floating restaurant in Bembridge Harbour. Craft beer fans should visit the **Pilot Boat Inn** (pilotboat.co.uk), which is home to the **Wight Knuckle Microbrewery** (wightknucklebrewery.com).

WW Woodford & Sons (woodfordandsons. co.uk) delicatessen in the centre of the village is famous for its sausage rolls, which were described as the "best ever" by TV chef James Martin.

BRADING

WHY GO? Park up at the top of town near the Norman church of St Mary's and take a wander along the main street to appreciate some of Brading's interesting heritage, including the slightly gory remnant of the Bull Ring in front of the town hall. Just outside the town you'll find Brading Roman Villa (bradingromanvilla.org. uk), which offers a comprehensive history of the days of Roman occupation on the Island.

Nearby is **Adgestone Vineyard** (adgestonevineyard.co.uk), the oldest of its kind in the country and the perfect place to pick up a unique souvenir. Start with a self-guided audio tour where you can learn about the wine-making process. Then, treat yourself to a bottle of 'Something Blue' – the only blue sparkling wine made in the UK.

Feeling Hungry?

The Yarbridge (theyarbridgeinn.co.uk) is a popular pub on the outskirts of Brading with an excellent reputation for good quality food. On Sundays, order a 'roast platter' for four from the **Hungry Bear** (hungrybear.online) in the high street. The restaurant prides itself on generous portion sizes and freshly produced food.



CULVER DOWN

WHY GO? Culver Down is accessible by car or foot for picturesque walks or a pub meal at the **Culver Haven Inn** (culverhaven.com). There are spectacular views from Culver across Sandown, Shanklin, Whitecliff Bay and Bembridge.

There are still some remnants of Culver's military history with the substantial **Bembridge Fort** (nationaltrust.org.uk), and a World War II anti-aircraft battery.

SANDOWN

WHY GO? Sandown is famed for its long stretches of sandy beach and traditional pleasure pier with soft play, amusements, and bowling. Hotels, apartments and restaurants line the esplanade which links the town with Lake and Shanklin.


Towards the Yaverland end is **Sandham Gardens** (sandhamgardens.com), with its
excellent playground, go karts, bouncy nets and
dinosaur-themed minigolf course – complete
with smoking volcano. Combine the visit
with a trip to the pterosaur-shaped museum
of **Dinosaur Isle** (dinosaurisle.com) or meet
the lions and tigers of **Wildheart Animal Sanctuary** (wildheartanimalsanctuary.org). The
Sanctuary now has two giant bamboo domes,
which make it even easier to get up close with
some of nature's most amazing primates.

Feeling Hungry?

The sea view draws most diners to Sandown's seafront, but there are also a handful of stand-out restaurants within the town centre. **Bellamy's Bistro** (facebook.com/bellamysbistro) in the High Street has a strong local reputation for offering an unfussy and hearty meal. Cocktails are served a few doors up in the **Cellar Bar** (thecellar.bar).



Top Tip - Crafty Night Out
Sandown is famed for its traditional seaside fun, but it's also home to
Boojum & Snark (boojumandsnark.co.uk)
- one of the Island's most creative and unusual venues. Throw some shapes at the monthly silent disco or sit down with a drink at one of their storytelling nights. You might even like to discover your inner orc and join the Dungeons & Dragons inspired role playing night called Snarks & Dragons. If all that sounds too much, just pop in for a pint of lovingly curated craft beer!

















SHANKLIN

Why Go? The resort town of Shanklin is split into two distinct areas: the Old Village, with its pretty streets and thatched roofs, and the newer town, from which the road to the esplanade snakes down the hill to the seafront and sandy beaches. The main beach gets busy in the summer, but it quietens down as you walk towards Lake, past Small Hope Beach. Low tide is the best time to visit if you want to ensure you have plenty of space for building sandcastles.

A short walk away is **Rylstone Gardens**, which has a traditional minigolf course and café. Visit on a Sunday afternoon and you might hear a local brass band performing in the park.

Rylstone Gardens is by the entrance to one of the Isle of Wight's oldest, and most understated attractions, **Shanklin Chine** (shanklinchine.co.uk). The Chine is beautiful

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at any time of day, but really comes into its own after dark, when its stunning landscapes, waterfalls, and plant life are brought to life by magical illuminations. The ticket price includes entry for seven days, so it is best value to visit at the start of your holiday.

Take a look at the What's On guide for **Shanklin Theatre** (shanklintheatre.com) if you fancy a night out during your holiday. This charming 600-seat venue hosts big name comedians and performers, as well as showcasing local theatre groups.

Shanklin Seafront (shanklinseafront.co.uk) is the place for last-minute bucket and spade purchases or a trip to the arcades. Dinosaur fans will enjoy Jurassic Bay minigolf, or there's an indoor course called Caddyshack, which provides a good challenge for competitive siblings.

Feeling Hungry?

Shanklin's Old Village is the place for a cream tea on a sunny afternoon. Visit the fairy garden at the **Old Thatch Teashop** (oldthatchteashop. co.uk) or tuck into an Isle of Wight-shaped scone at **Vernon Cottage** (vernoncottage.co.uk).

Shanklin's Esplanade is your best bet for relaxed dining with a sea view. **The Waterfront** (waterfront-inn.co.uk) and **The Steamer** (thesteamer.co.uk) are two adjacent restaurants that have a lively atmosphere on a summer's evening. Keep walking to the end of the esplanade to discover the **Fisherman's Cottage** (shanklinchine.co.uk/fishermans-cottage), which is a thatched pub right on the beach.

For an elevated coastal view, try **Blueberry's Café** (facebook.com/BlueberrysCafelOW). This friendly café overlooking Shanklin Beach won gold at the Red Funnel Isle of Wight Awards 2022 in the Best Café or Tearoom category.



BONCHURCH

Why Go? The village of Bonchurch has a certain magical air to it thanks to its notable history and weaving landscape. At the centre of Bonchurch is a large spring-fed pond, with a selection of beautiful old cottages and buildings running along the main village road.

St Boniface Church is nearby, parts of which date back to the 11th Century. A short walk down from here brings you to Monk's Bay, a small sand and shingle beach with rockpools to explore at low tide. **The Bonchurch Inn** (bonchurch-inn.co.uk) further up the village is a delightful old pub, with a courtyard garden and an extensive menu of home-cooked Italian cuisine.

Top Tip - Dickens in Bonchurch and Ventnor

Bonchurch and Ventnor are home to the Charles Dickens Literary Walks (havilandcottage.com/dickens), which explore key locations which helped shape the author's work. Highlights include the house in which Dickens stayed whilst writing some of David Copperfield. The trails also explore the possibility that several of Dickens' characters were based on local residents that he met during his time on the Island. The grave of the 'real Miss Havisham' can be found in Ventnor Cemetery!





VENTNOR

Why Go? Ventnor's steep incline and isolated coastal location give it a feel like nowhere else on the Isle of Wight. A tall hillside looms over the town, giving it shelter and creating a "microclimate" where Mediterranean plants grow in the famous **Botanic Gardens** (botanic.co.uk).

A free alternative is **Ventnor Park** (ventnorpark.co.uk), which offers live music in the summer, a putting green, and an outdoor gym overlooking the sea.

Ventnor's seafront is a charming spot. Toddlers will enjoy the Isle of Wight-shaped paddling pool, which is backed by the cascade gardens. Grown-ups can enjoy the views and order breakfast from **Besty & Spinky's Café** (facebook.com/BestyandSpinkys).

Ventnor has become a cultural hotspot on the Island, with events such as **Ventnor Fringe** (vfringe.co.uk). Expect to see clifftop shows, live music around the town, and comedians trying out new material.

The festival is curated by **Ventnor Exchange** (ventnorexchange.co.uk), a theatre, craft beer bar, and record store housed in the old Post Office.



Ventnor's vintage clothing stores have been known to draw celebrity shoppers, whilst there is a great collection of independent boutiques to browse, such as bespoke jewellers **Honeybourne Jewellery** (honeybournejewellery.com). Pop round the corner to try one of the home-made ice creams at **The Ventnorian** (craveicecream.co.uk).

There are two popular coastal walks that start from Ventnor's Esplanade. To the east is the wheelchair-accessible one-mile walk to Bonchurch. Stop off at **The Seapot** (facebook.com/seapotcafe) for a bite to eat if the sun is shining. To the west is the more challenging coastal path to Steephill Cove, which is a picture-perfect bay with thatched cottages, deck chairs, and ice creams.

Feeling Hungry?

Ventnor has recently transformed into something of a foodie destination, with several of the Island's top-rated restaurants on the seafront and main streets. **The Royal Hotel** (royalhoteliow.co.uk) is renowned for its afternoon tea, but it has also gained much attention for its experimental new tasting menu called Se7en.

Meanwhile, the seafront **Smoking Lobster** restaurant (smokinglobster.co.uk) featured on Best of Britain by the Sea on More 4. Grace Dent declared their lobster to be the best she had ever tasted!

For live music and crashing waves, try the **Spyglass Inn** (thespyglass.com).

Top Tip - Walking with Dinosaurs and Planets!

Two of the Isle of Wight's finest coastal walks start from Ventnor – and both offer something of an extra twist! The coastal path to Bonchurch includes a scale model of the Solar System, with the planets marked out over about 1000 paces. Meanwhile, the undulating walk from Ventnor to Steephill Cove offers a Diplodocus Labyrinth. The maze-like outline is shaped onto the hillside overlooking the sea and is great fun for little ones.

ST LAWRENCE & NITON

Why Go? The Undercliff area around St Lawrence and Niton is where you will find the Island's most isolated and rugged beaches.

A landslip in between the two has made access tricky. However, by following the coast path from Ventnor you will discover the small bays of Woody and Binnel. You may have these beaches all to yourself, even on a summer's day.

On the Niton end, there are several walks that take you around **St Catherine's Lighthouse** (another photographer's favourite). From here you can walk back to Castlehaven and Reeth Bay.

A short drive from Niton is **Blackgang Chine** (blackgangchine.com): the UK's oldest theme park, and maker of many childhood memories. Park up at the nearby Blackgang Viewpoint car park and walk up to St Catherine's Oratory for spectacular views on a clear day.







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BRIGHSTONE & SURROUNDING AREA

WHY GO? One of the bigger villages in the west is Brighstone with its 12th century church and traditional farmhouses.

The area around North Street has a similar charm to Godshill but without the crowds. Make your way round the tiny Brighstone village museum and library before visiting the thatched newsagents and village shop. Nearby is an excellent tea rooms (wolveseyhouse.com), which is a popular stopping point for cyclists. Bicycles and e-bikes can be hired from

Brighstone Newsagents

(brighstonenewsagents.co.uk/bike-hire).

If you have a few minutes spare, pop on a pair of wellies to visit **Brighstone's Dragon Tree**. This ancient oak can be found on a footpath off New Road and appears to be growing sideways over a stream.

Nearby, you'll find **Mottistone Manor Gardens** (nationaltrust.org.uk), where children will enjoy

the flowerpot trails and den building area. From here, it's just a short walk onto the downs to the mysterious "Longstone" monument. The larger of the two stones is nearly four metres tall and is thought to have been erected thousands of years ago.

Feeling Hungry?

Many villages and hamlets in this part of the West Wight have their own traditional pub.

Curiously, Hulverstone and Calbourne both have a local pub called **The Sun** (characterinns.co.uk/ the-sun-inn and sun-calbourne.co.uk). Whilst in Calbourne, take a walk past the riverside thatched cottages of Winkle Street.

On warm evenings, sit by the trout stream in the beer garden of **The Crown** at Shorwell (facebook.com/CrownShorwell), which is now under new ownership. For one of the Island's most sought after afternoon teas call in at

Chessell Pottery Café

(chessellpotterycafe.co.uk)

Top Tip - A Night with the Stars

The coastal road near Atherfield in the West Wight is one of the best places in southern England for stargazing. Light pollution is minimal, so there's an opportunity for some spectacular sights on a clear night. Keen photographers can produce some magnificent slow-exposure work with the help of a tripod. During the summer, stargazers looking south should get a good view of the so-called Summer Triangle. This is made up of Deneb, Altair, and Vega. To the north, clear nights will show off The Plough, Polaris, and Cassiopeia.

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FRESHWATER

WHY GO? The inland half of Freshwater is a busy village with a modest selection of shops and cafés. **Freshwater Coffee House** (freshwatercoffeehouse.co.uk) is a local favourite for pancakes and pastries.

As you head towards Freshwater Bay, take a moment to admire the Island's only thatched church – **St Agnes.**

Freshwater Bay itself is split into two beaches. The main section consists of a pebble beach, with chalk cliffs and impressive rock stacks at the eastern end. At low tide, head round to the right as you face the sea, and you'll find a secluded bay that is good for paddling and rockpooling.

Before you leave the Bay, buy an ice cream to support the beach shop, which raises money for the village's **lifeboat station** (freshwaterlifeboat.org.uk).

If you fancy a climb, walk up towards the Tennyson Monument, which overlooks Freshwater Bay. From here, you'll get a distant view of Compton Bay, which was named as one of the world's best beaches by The Sunday Times. For a shorter walk to the viewpoint, park at the National Trust's Tennyson Down Car Park. You can also visit Alfred, Lord Tennyson's former home of **Farringford** (farringford.co.uk) to discover the Poet Laureate's love for the Island.

The 1970 Isle of Wight Festival took place on farmland around Freshwater. **Dimbola Lodge** (dimbola.co.uk) hosts an exhibition about the time that more than half a million people descended on the West Wight to watch Jimi Hendrix, Joni Mitchell, and The Doors.

Feeling Hungry?

The Piano Café (thepianocafe.co.uk) sits between the village of Freshwater and the Bay. It gained its name as the former residence of Queen Victoria's piano tuner. Most visit for lunch, but come back on a summer's evening for dinner with musical accompaniment.

The Red Lion (redlion-freshwater.co.uk) is a traditional pub with a good reputation near to Freshwater's attractive causeway. Meanwhile, good views and great burgers can be found at **The Cow** (thecowco.com) which won silver in the 'Best Burger' category at the Red Funnel Isle of Wight Awards 2022.

THE NEEDLES

WHY GO? The Needles is the Isle of Wight's most famous landmark, made up of a row of striking chalk stacks that rise up from the sea beneath. The red and white striped lighthouse protects seafarers from the rocks.

Families can ride the carousel and the chairlift at **The Needles Landmark Attraction** (theneedles.co.uk). The chairlift leads to Alum Bay with its famous multicoloured cliffs.

From the beach, take the **Needles Pleasure Cruise** (needlespleasurecruises.co.uk) for the perfect "up-close" view of the lighthouse.
Thrill-seekers can switch to a high-speed boat which will take you right round the lighthouse, to discover a hidden cove on the other side.

Finish with a round of minigolf and a sand-filled souvenir back in the amusement park.

The **Needles Old Battery** (nationaltrust.org.uk) offers the historic side of the headland's story. Head down the tunnel to the windswept lookout or visit the tea rooms for a cream tea with a view that is hard to beat. For a free alternative, visit the **New Battery** with its unusual past as a rocket testing base.




Top Tip - The Wild West Wight
Explorers looking for a wild day out should sign up for a session with
Freshwater Bay Coasteering (fbciow.com)
You'll be equipped with wetsuits, lifejackets and helmets before setting off towards a hidden bay. Expert guides will have you swimming, rock climbing and traversing you way round the rugged cliffs before stepping inside caves once used by smugglers. The activities are run by fully qualified lifeguards and are suitable for ages 12+.

YARMOUTH

WHY GO? The historic port town of Yarmouth sits at the entrance of the River Yar and includes some of the oldest architecture on the Island. It is popular for sailing, with a busy harbour located at the mouth of the river estuary. Walk along the pier for great views of the Solent or get a window seat at Gossips Café (facebook.com/thegossipscafe).

Yarmouth is one of the smallest towns in the country, but it has pretty streets and a modest selection of gift shops, galleries, and antique shops. Anne Toms' **Yarmouth Gallery** is worth a visit to admire its West Wight seascapes and artworks from local sculptors.

English Heritage members should take a look at 16th century **Yarmouth Castle**. What it lacks in size it makes up for in setting and it is a great place to sit for a picnic and enjoy sea views on a warm day.

Just a short drive from Yarmouth, **Tapnell Farm** (tapnellfarm.com) plays host to a much-loved farm park and restaurant. Older children will enjoy the Total Wipeout-style antics at the Isle of Wight Agua Park. Younger children can meet animals, ride zip wires and pedal on the go karts at the farm park. Other on-site activities include football golf, axe throwing, and archery. The farm's events barn has a busy schedule including a pumpkin festival and cinema nights.

Close up animal encounters are also available at **West Wight Alpacas** (westwightalpacas.co.uk) in Wellow and Hill Farm Stables

(hillfarmstables.com) in nearby Freshwater. Another hidden gem is Fort Victoria (fort-victoria.co.uk) to the west of Yarmouth. In addition to a 1km-long stretch of beach and woodland to explore, you'll also find attractions including a home for reptiles (reptilarium.org).

A short distance along the coast are the popular beaches of Colwell Bay and Totland Bay. Both are best at low tide when the gorgeous sand is exposed.

Feeling Hungry?

Yarmouth has several excellent places for light bites, including PO41 Coffee House (facebook.com/PO41CoffeeHouse) and Grace's **Bakerv** (gracesbakerv.uk). Cyclists and dog walkers should stop at Off the Rails (offtherailsyarmouth.co.uk), which is housed in the former railway station. Modern fine dining with a harbourside view is available at **The Terrace** (theterraceiow.co.uk). It is one of two Yarmouth restaurants to feature in the Michelin guide – the other being the Conservatory at **The George** (thegeorge.co.uk/conservatory).

Along the coast, Totland Bay has casual beachside eateries with sunset views. Seaside dining is offered at **The Waterfront** (waterfrontiow.com). which serves a Mediterranean-inspired menu along with some traditional British classics.





FASHION & STYLE

Whether you're in need of glad rags for a date night or flip flops for the beach, these shops have you got you covered.

A carefully curated collection of designer and unique vintage pieces, **The Velvet Pig** is a celebration of style and individuality. Look out for the shop's creative window display in Union Street, Ryde.

Visual Impact: The Island's original independent style boutique, open since 1985. At **Visual Impact** you'll find the latest trends from premium brands such as *Levi's, Barbour, Farah Vintage, Ralph Lauren,* and more. As important as quality garments is customer service, with a style-conscious team on hand to dress you to impress. Find them at Holyrood Street, Newport.

Skintrade: Named after a Duran Duran song over 20 years ago, **Skintrade** is THE Island outlet for men's casual cool garments and footwear. Stockists of *Vans, Converse, Nike SB*, and more, **Skintrade** offers everything you need for Saturday nights out through to a comfy chilled Sunday. The shop also has its own café serving **Jaspers Coffee**, which is roasted in Brading, as well as sandwiches made from homemade bread, and more.



LOCALLY MADE

Discover a community of talented artists, crafters, artisans and photographers, all inspired by the local landscape and Island life.

Quay Arts: The Island's leading gallery showcasing local art and performance. You'll also find a great craft shop stocking jewellery, ceramics, textiles, and one-off pieces by local artists for a unique Island memento or gift.

Arreton Barns: In the heart of the countryside, you'll find this great craft village full of independent shops run by local artisans. You'll find leathercraft, glass works, crafts, collectibles, jewellery, photography, art, and more.

TASTE OF WIGHT

For a unique flavour of the Island, try...

Mermaid Gin: You're probably familiar with the beautiful sea blue bottle, but did you know **Mermaid Gin** was created and distilled right here at the **Isle of Wight Distillery** – taking its unique flavour from local sea botanicals?

Tomatoes: The "sunshine fruit", The **Tomato Stall's** Island grown tomatoes are the most flavourful and colourful you'll ever taste, thanks to more hours of sunlight intensified by the sea – making for perfect ripening conditions.

Cheese & Dairy: Family-run since 1923, Briddlesford Farm's herd of Guernsey Cows produces a range of high-quality dairy products, from fresh creams and butters to delicious cheeses – we highly recommend the halloumi. For devoted cheese lovers, see the Isle of Wight Cheese Company, which creates handmade cheeses unique to the Island: Gallybagger and Isle of Wight Soft/Blue.

Honey & Jam: A beautiful and serene spot, Quarr Abbey is home to a small group of Benedictine Monks who lovingly care for the grounds and grow their own produce for sale – Quarr Abbey ale, honey, jam, and chutney.

Farm Shops: You'll find the finest Isle of Wight tomatoes, mushrooms, garlic, asparagus, cheese, meat, gin, preserves, and more at farm shops and kitchens across the Wight, perfect for taking a flavour of the Island home. See The Garlic Farm, Briddlesford Farm, Harvey Browns and Isle of Wight Farm Shop.





GIFTS & SOUVENIRS

Ideas for taking a little piece of the Isle of Wight home with you.

Coloured Sand: For the ultimate Island souvenir, head for the **Needles Landmark Attraction** and try your hand at "Marmotinto" – the layering of 21 unique coloured sands from the Alum Bay cliff in a glass ornament. A souvenir for tourists since Victorian times, the tradition remains as popular as ever today.

Red Squirrels: Our most famous resident, the Red Squirrel, is a muse for many local artists and crafters. From plush toys to intricate line drawings, you'll find cute squirrel-themed gifts across the Island supporting the **IOW Red Squirrel Trust.**

Garlic: A trip to the Island wouldn't be complete without sampling our garlic. Head to the Garlic Farm to see how it's grown, why it grows so well here, and sample the crop. 



Every year, Red Funnel customers and staff select a new charity to focus our fundraising efforts on. This year we're delighted to be working with the fantastic **Aspire Ryde**

Aspire is a local charity based in Ryde and was formed eight years ago. Initially, Aspire was created to repurpose a redundant church building for community use. Since then, the charity has grown considerably and is a vital hub that supports the community in several ways, particularly providing spaces and groups in which people can meet, grow and enhance their friendships and social networks.

The original building now incorporates a large café and soft play, a creative hub with recording and rehearsal studios, commercial kitchens serving food to the community and even an escape room, 'The Lost Crypt', which is not only great fun but generates income for other projects.

Aspire moved into a second building in 2019 providing the community with a shop, bike and paint recycling projects and numerous groups both in its buildings and out in the wider community. Future plans see this second property developed to include supported housing.

DOGGIE DAYS OUT

The Isle of Wight is renowned for its list of attractions, and a whole host of them welcome happy hounds. The **IW Steam Railway** is one of the highlights, where you can step back in time and take your dog for a steam train ride! If you're into your history, **Fort Victoria Country Park** in Yarmouth boasts an 19th century gun battery with walks offering cross-Solent views, or you can explore the grounds of medieval **Carisbrooke Castle** in the centre of the Island. Head to **Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary** in Yarmouth with free admission and the chance for your dog to make some furry friends, or to **Godshill Model Village** for plenty of hilarious "giant dog" photo opportunities.

WALKS

St Catherine's Oratory & The Buddle Inn

– discover the former 14th century lighthouse known locally as 'the Pepperpot' before meandering through the former smugglers' village of Niton on your way to the Buddle Inn.

Brighstone Forest & Sun Inn/Crown Inn -

head up onto Brighstone Down to discover a vast area of trees and trails. Various walking routes drop down into nearby villages to access traditional country pubs such as the Sun Inn at Hulverstone, and The Crown at Shorwell.

BEST BEACHES

The Island has over 25 beaches in total, but some limit access for dogs during the main season. Year-round restriction-free beaches include Yaverland Beach, with its endless golden sand is perfect for building sandcastles or digging holes – just make sure to head left from the car park. Luccombe Bay, nestled in the cliffs by Shanklin, is a lesser-known spot where your dog can scamper around or even sniff out a secret cave. Venture beyond grassy sand dunes to uncover the unspoilt St Helens Beach – the main beach is restricted for dogs in the summer, but everything to the left of the old church is fine, and the "Duver" to the rear of the beach is great for walks. Seagrove Beach near Seaview is a picturesque, secluded spot at low tide with smooth sand and crystal-clear waters.

DOG-FRIENDLY DINING

There are loads of places you can dine in with your dog, perfect for when you want to go out for a meal with all the family! **Character Inns** have charming dog-friendly pubs dotted throughout the Island – great for cosying up by a roaring fire after a long walk. **The Lifeboat** in East Cowes is highly recommended and offers views of the Medina, while across the river The **Coast Bar & Dining Room** in Cowes serves up delicious food in contemporary surrounding. **Off The Rails** in Yarmouth's former railway station also boasts a mouth-watering menu, even featuring a selection of delectable doggy meals - bone appetit!

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
Spending his time exploring the Island's many beaches, caves, forests, and countryside, Go Pro Ambassador & Travel Creator The Cam of Sam discovered his talent for outdoor photography through his love for the Isle of Wight's unique and varied landscape. Read on for some of Sam's top spots for photography worthy of your grid!

The Island is a great place to grow up, with BBQs on the beach all summer long, water sports on your doorstep, and natural beauty at every turn. When the wind and waves were down, my friends and I would venture out and explore every corner of the Island, looking for places to build dens and discovering the best skate spots – which saw us stumbling upon the most spectacular views and hidden gems the Island has to offer.

This appreciation for my home really drove my passion for photography. I first started taking photos when I was learning to surf, but soon started capturing all my adventures across the Island. A plethora of beaches, sea caves, and epic landscapes make for the perfect backdrop, complemented by wonderful weather and longer hours of sunlight. The Isle of Wight is a mecca for all types of photography, whether you're shooting with a phone, Go Pro, or camera.

Here are some of my favourite places to photograph around the Island...









I call it Mermaid Bay, and it's accessible only via kavak or paddleboard but viewable from the cliff tops. This is a perfect little beach just by Freshwater Bay, Private, south facing, and catching sun all day long makes it a perfect shooting spot, but watch out for the tide and the conditions so you don't get stuck!







The coastal path along to Freshwater Bay offers 360-degree views, creating amazing backdrops for portraits, and wonderful panoramas of the cliff tops. The winding cliff edges and sea stacks create great depth for wide-angle shots too, acting as midground elements to complement the horizon in the background.










A wonderful beach with a whole range of features such as rock pools, groynes, and Bembridge Lifeboat Station. Get shots of the sea fort from here and see a wealth of wildlife living in the rocks and seaweed. It can also make for some very interesting underwater shots when the water is clear, and the pools make for great reflections at low tide.












The Needles is a must-visit location, boasting huge cliffs and a unique line of sea stacks punctuated by its iconic lighthouse. This is a great spot for big impact shots using the big cliff drop-offs, amazing for sunset shots with lots of nautical traffic, and the Needles themselves act as an interesting background element whether you're shooting from the cliff tops or from the water.








Seagrove Bay is a great spot for a shoot in the water with lovely water clarity in the right conditions, and lots of boats moored up for points of interest. However, there's limited parking, so prepare to walk a little.







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Borthwood Copse is perfect for an autumn shoot. With tall trees and large clearings, the sunshine pours through, casting some wonderful light on your subject. Perfect for nature walk vibes all year round.







Whitecliff Bay is a beautiful beach to visit all year round. A long curving beach with Culver Cliff in the background, it makes for a very picturesque spot to shoot. During the summer it's often full of boats and paddleboarders, so make sure to use those features as background elements, and in winter the low sun will cast lovely long shadows which can be used to great effect!

SIGHTS OUT AT SEA

The ferry ride across to the Isle of Wight is the start of everyone's holiday. And you don't have to wait until you arrive to start sightseeing! Here are just some of the things to keep an eye out for as you make the journey over to the Island from Southampton:

THE ROYAL PIER PAVILION

This one's easy to spot as you arrive at our Southampton ferry terminal, particularly at night when it's lit up in purple lights! When Red Funnel was first formed, we ran a fleet of paddle steamers that operated excursions to destinations around the Island, and along the south coast. These departed from "Royal Pier", and the impressive pavilion building is still in use as a restaurant.



OCEAN CRUISE TERMINAL

This striking landmark on Southampton's waterfront is where you'll find some of the world's largest cruise ships docking. See if you can spot some of the famous Cunard and P&O Cruises vessels as you depart for the Island, and if you're travelling in the late afternoon/early evening you might even get to sail alongside them as they depart Southampton for their global destinations.



HYTHE PIER

The Hythe pier is difficult to miss, as at 640 metres in length, it's the 7th longest in Britain. It is also the home of the world's oldest working pier train, which links the village of Hythe and its marina to a small ferry that runs a regular service to the City of Southampton.



NETLEY CHAPEL

This striking chapel, on the eastern side of the river, is all that now remains of one of Britain's first purpose-built hospitals. Constructed for veterans of the Crimean War, the original 220-acre site was the largest of its time but was demolished after a fire in 1966. The site is now open to the public as part of Royal Victoria Country Park.



COWES CASTLE / **ROYAL YACHT SQADRON**

As you approach the Island and arrive at Cowes Harbour, you'll see another of Henry VIII's forts, Cowes Castle. The castle is now home and clubhouse to the Royal Yacht Squadron, whose Club organises yacht racing as a principal feature of the now globally famous Cowes Week regatta. Look carefully at the front and you might see the cannons that are used for starting races.



CALSHOT CASTLE

The picturesque Calshot Castle was originally built by Henry VIII to defend the entrance to Southampton waters. As our ferry reaches the Solent, the castle is easily visible at the end of Calshot Spit, which extends from the west into the main waters, with Calshot beach and its long row of beach huts visible further along.



COLUMBINE BUILDING

The striking Columbine building on the East Cowes waterfront has been a central point of Island industry for many years. Starting with Saunders Roe, which was involved in everything from sea planes, hovercrafts, and rockets, it is currently home to Wight Shipyard, which built two of Red Funnel's Red Jet fleet. When you spot the iconic Union Jack doors, you've arrived on the Island!



OTHER RED FUNNEL FERRIES

Southampton's waters and the Solent are always busy with shipping movements, not least with our very own Red Funnel fleet. At peak time we will often have our three vehicle ferries, two Hi-Speed passenger ferries, and our freight ferry all out on the water - so watch out for them, and don't forget to give our other passengers and crew a customary wave!





GETTING TO THE ISLE OF WIGHT



Red Funnel's 1-hour vehicle ferry service operates 365 days a year between Southampton and East Cowes — the northern tip of the Isle of Wight.

TRAVELLING WITH RED FUNNEL FERRIES

Our three accessible vehicle ferries run throughout the day (and night!) with more frequent sailings during the main holiday season — between April and October. We'd always advise to book ahead for the best rates, especially if you're planning on visiting during the peak season.

If you fancy a bite, or even a pint, we serve a range of hot meals, snacks, and refreshments on all three vehicle ferries, with a fully licensed bar on board. Don't forget to take in the views from the sundeck, and if you're travelling with pets, we have a dedicated lounge for your furry friends.

USEFUL INFORMATION

BUSES:

The Island's bus provider is Southern Vectis. These buses travel to all corners of the Island, with stops right at, or very near, the ferry terminals. They offer a variety of ticket types including group and period fares. There are two major bus stations on the Island – in Newport and Ryde. The Newport bus station is the bigger of the two and has a useful travel shop. Paying for the bus is easy; the buses accept cash and contactless payments via card or mobile phone. For some of the best views on the Island, check out the open top buses on the Needles & Downs Breezer tours. **islandbuses.info**

CARS:

Most of the Island is made up of narrow country roads (all accompanied by amazing views!) so for safety and enjoyment, take it easy when driving them. Whilst not prohibitive, the narrow roads are a challenge for larger vehicles, so it is highly advisable to plan your arrival and departure from the Island during daylight hours if you're bringing a motorhome or towing a caravan. You will often encounter horse riders and cyclists on the Island's roads.

ACCESSIBILITY:

For wheelchair users or people with additional needs who are travelling to the Island you can find out more about accessible travel, places to stay, visit and eat by heading to **isleaccess.co.uk**, a user-led charity committed to encouraging and promoting greater accessibility and inclusion on the Isle of Wight for people with disabilities.

TRAINS:

The Island's main train line operates between Ryde and Shanklin. The train stops at: Ryde Pier head, Ryde Esplanade (where the bus station is), Ryde St John's Road, Smallbrook Junction (connecting with Isle of Wight Steam Railway), Brading, Sandown, Lake and Shanklin. Tickets for the Island Line can be purchased online or via ticket machines at the stations. For times and more information, see

TAXIS:

The Island has several taxi services, which tend to operate locally around the bigger towns and areas. There's no Uber network on the Island at the time of writing, but there is a recently launched app called **Go Taxi**, which looks to offer a similar service. It's crucial to book taxis in advance on the Island, as they get very busy, especially when demand increases at peak visitor season. The Island also has several water taxi terminals, with popular departures from Cowes, Bembridge and Yarmouth.

ELECTRIC TRAVEL:

There are lots of places to hire bicycles, including e-bikes, through providers such as **wightcyclehire.co.uk**. You'll also find e-scooters and e-bikes available to hire in some of the main towns, which are available through the **Beryl** app. Driving an electric vehicle? You'll find several charging points around the Island. For charge point locations, visit **iow.gov.uk**.
